Native Alternatives to Invasive Plants You May Find at Your Local Nursery

INVASIVE plant – Chinese Privet



Chinese Privet - Ligustrum sinensis

Semi-evergreen ornamental shrub or small tree that has become an invasive weed in southeastern US.

Produces abundant root suckers and forms impenetrable thickets - 6-13' tall crowding out native species

Flower odor is unpleasant to some. Both foliage and fruit are toxic to humans and livestock

Native to China

Brought to the U.S. 1852 to be used as hedges and in landscaping and has escaped cultivation

Preventive measure: Do not plant

Perennial deciduous shrub

Height: 12-24'

Blooms: white

April – May

Part shade

Special value to bumblebees Significant fall foliage color
